




Ross Anderson & Patient News Publishing







PARTICIPATION



Gold Medal Olympian, Frank Mazza, Inducted into Hall of Fame

Fast Frank Mazza is a gold Medal Olympian and a Gold, Sliver and Bronze Paralympic Games Medalist. Frank started racing in 1982 and represented Canada internationally from 1983-1986. A two-year training program was designed by Team Canada for him and he had a racing wheelchair made for him. Frank's goal was to be able to compete at the 1984 Olympics for the Physically Disabled which were called the International Games for the Disabled and were equivalent to todays Paralympics. On June 22, 2019 Frank will be inducted into Cobourg's Hall of Fame. The Head Coach of the C.P. Canadian Team said "Frank held Provincial and National records at one time and was the greatest one arm wheeler in the world-always competing against two arm wheelers". Frank is a true Olympian and Inspiration to us all.

It's Never too Late to Follow Your Dreams



Success Story

"An empty lantern provides no light. Self-care is the fuel that allows your light to shine brightly."-unknown.

When we work in a profession that cares for others, we often forget that we too need to take care of ourselves. The Early Learning Quality Initiative was able to offer a Wellness Retreat for those working in our local early learning community. This opportunity gave those that attended permission to put themselves first; maybe to try something new or to do something they know they love to do! There were opportunities to reconnect with other educators we haven't seen in a while, for team members to participate in activities and sessions together that weren't a focus on 'learning for work' and for individuals to explore a variety of things that focus on personal well-being. With the support of our municipality, this event was not only well attended, it was much appreciated!

GUIDANCE encowiagement & OPPORTUNITIES for growth...



The Tri County Life Share program has established living alternatives for those over the age of eighteen who have an intellectual disability living across all their communities and beyond. Through constant promotion and the support of a family setting, individuals receive guidance, encouragement and multiple opportunities for growth. The Life Share Program has developed a flexible wrap around support system that recognizes the uniqueness and abilities of the individual and the family. The Life Share Program started with a small base of ten individuals and now supports over 95 individuals living within the three communities. This program consistently exceeds the provincial standard and is always seeking creative ways to expand and support those in need.



Community Living Trent Highlands is a proud member agency of the United Way! Thanks to their generosity CLTH has been able to provide support to our self advocate groups and Peer Educators.



In kind, in 2018-2019 our agency decided to host one large fundraising event and therefore the "Annual CLTH United Way Baseball Tournament" was launched. We had a very successful first year. We raised a total of \$3315 to be donated to both United Way Peterborough and United Way Kawartha Lakes.

Thanks to the support of our whole agency, with employee payroll deductions we were able to raise another \$5656. Total donations made were United Way Kawartha Lakes/Haliburton at \$5212 and United Way Peterborough with \$3769.
